

These are just a few of the magnificent cities and regions in Iran, rich in culture and art, each boasting its unique handicrafts that have left an enduring mark on the world.






Meybod The World Cityof Zilou


Marivan The World City of Klash Shoes

Dezful World Crafts City for Basket (Kapu) Weaving

In Dezful, skilled Khuzestani weavers create intricately woven straw baskets known as "Kapo" by deftly interlacing the young palm tree stems with reeds called "Kertak." These Kapo baskets are not only sturdy but also boast beautiful colors, making them versatile for various purposes in daily life. Because Kertak plants are not appealing to animals or insects and are resistant to pests, the resulting woven products are highly durable and in great demand.

The patterns on Kapu are usually almond-shaped or triangular, inspired by the historical texture of the city of Dezful and its architecture. Depending on their size and shape, Kapus have various uses, such as jewelry boxes, fruit bowls, serving trays, bread baskets, and more. As a result, Kapo is entirely crafted from natural materials, and Dezful stands as the primary center for Kapo weaving.








Kashan World Crafts City for Traditional Textile Weaving

If you have an interest in traditional textiles, it is highly recommended to visit Kashan to become acquainted with traditional weaving products from textile workshops closely. These fabric workshops still offer unique and unparalleled products. In fact, Kashan's handwoven textiles and its traditional dyeing techniques, evident in brocades, exquisite velvet, and the art of SherBafi, have their origins in the ancient and historic culture of this region.

One of the main reasons for inscribing Kashan as a national and subsequently a world city of traditional textile weaving is the exploration of the Silk Hills, where the discovered artifacts indicate the existence of early weaving in this region. Aaccording to inbound tourists and credible documents, textile weaving in Kashan reached its peak during the Seljuk period. The city fame in silk and gold in the 6th century even attracted Marco Polo, the Venetian traveler, to Kashan.





Kharashad The World Village of Traditional Textiles





These women create Chador-Shab without predefined patterns, drawing inspiration from nature. This handy fabric can be used in curtains, bedcovers, tablecloths, waistbands, and more.





Kalpourgan The World Village of Pottery

The women of the Baloch village of Kalpourgan in Sistan and Baluchestan province seize your attention with their unique pottery-making style, employing entirely traditional and basic techniques. A visit to this village is similar to make a visit to a living pottery museum. Unlike common pottery-making methods, Kalpourgan pottery is embellished with patterns achieved by rubbing "Titoak" stone onto it, resulting in red pottery with distinct black designs, setting it apart from pottery in other Iranian regions.







Bandar Abbas The Creative Hub of Handicrafts and Indigenous Arts









Masouleh




Interested in locating the oldest and largest residential castles in Yazd province, Kharanaq in Ardakan county is an excellent choice. This village is divided into two parts, with only a few residents in the newer section, while the old historical part of the village lies uninhabited. If luck is on your side, you may even spot wildlife such as foxes, goats, sheep, and deer in the protected area of Darre Injir, close to the village.



SarAgha Seyyed Village

Upon entering the picturesque hillside houses of this mountainous village, you'll be greeted by one of Iran's most beautiful landscapes, set amidst the lush Zagros Mountains. The authentic and traditional attire of the people, their unique customs, and the pristine, captivating nature all contribute to the village's distinctive charm. Climatic conditions, including mineral springs and the unique local climate, combined with the village's far-reaching location surrounded by the mountains, have enabled its inhabitants to grow various types of herbs and medicinal plants, each with its own therapeutic properties.







Palangan



The stair-like architecture of Palangan, a mountain village in Kurdistan province, creates an exciting landscape where houses are built closely together, appearing as if they have climbed up the mountainside. In this style of architecture, one house's flat roof serves as the courtyard for the house above it.

This architectural design is common in regions of Iran where there is no flat land for house construction.






If your travels take you to northeastern Iran, don't miss the opportunity to visit the highland village and mountainous area known as "Tariqeh" in Kang. The village's geographic features reflect the influence of various natural factors, including sloping terrain and the use of local materials such as stone and wood, promoting a sustainable rural lifestyle.



A visit to the village of Makhunik will undoubtedly leave you in wonder of its unique architecture. The older residents of this village, were of short stature. Consequently, the roofs of houses in this village are very low, requiring visitors to bend entering the house. The petroglyphs near the Makhunik channel further confirm the ancient history of settlement in this region and bear witness to the enduring history of habitation in this area.







Hormuz Island

Hormuz is one of Iran's southern islands situated in the Persian Gulf, renowned for its red soil and vibrant sediments, making it a top tourist destination in Iran. Tourists often refer to this rainbow-hued island as the "Paradise for Geologists."



Lavan Island

Explore the remote and untouched Lavan Island to witness the pristine beauty of the open sea. Here, you can observe the nesting of hawksbill and green sea turtles from mid-February to early April. The best time to visit Lavan is during the second half of the Iranian year (October to March), particularly in the winter when the island enjoys mild and pleasant weather. If you have a fondness for seafood, you'll discover a variety of marine delicacies available on Lavan Island.





KishIsland



Kish Island offers serenity with its exceptional infrastructure and luxurious five-star hotels. You can partake in water sports, swimming, and diving along its coral beaches, or simply relax on its silver-sand shores. Kish Island boasts a distinctive feature—a network of underground aqueducts flowing beneath the salty waters of the Persian Gulf, providing freshwater. The remnants of an ancient water export platform from the north of the Persian Gulf to the south stand as a testament to the ingenuity and global significance of this Iranian island-city.
